A PROJECT GO INTRODUCTION

Welcome to the first issue of Ready, Set, GO!, a newsletter about the fresh initiatives of Project Get Outdoors (GO) in the St. Paul & Crookston areas! These initiatives have been assigned through Conservation Corps MN & IA to Amy Flatten, the St. Paul Community Mapping and Outreach Specialist, and Alysa Zimmerle, the Crookston Community Mapping and Outreach Specialist.

Project GO works to establish meaningful connections with nature and kids. The program was started in SW Minnesota back in 2005. Today, the program has spread throughout southern MN and is making it's way farther North! Weekly outings into the natural environment provide kids with unstructured play that helps with concentration, cooperative play, and cognitive thinking—all for free! The program is a community-supported program run by community volunteers with support from partnering organizations.

Amy and Alysa will be using these newsletters to update the communities involved and any others interested in the work happening to connect kids to nature!

CROOKSTON AREA: THINGS ARE HEATING UP

Alysa's position is partnered with the Statewide Health Improvement Program (SHIP), and so will be working in a few communities identified by this initiative. The Crookston area where Project GO will be working with are: Crookston, Mahnomen, Fossten, and Ada. These communities are already making big strides in healthy living—including connecting nature and children!

Project GO is already making headway in Crookston and Mahnomen! Project GO will be helping with a program at the Crookston Library in July—putting on an event with stations like mud-pie and tipi making, and games that make connections with how animals and plants work. There's a meeting scheduled with the Boys and Girls Club in Mahnomen to talk about partnership in creating a spot to host weekly outings for kids in Mahnomen. Crookston High Schoolers are also interested in working with Project GO, and are excited to help with locations and outings!

Even with the interest, these locations are still in need of community member support. Whether you're interested in working with kids—doing one outing or ten, helping with planning, or just offering support to the program, Alysa can use your assistance! The July 23rd program at the library also needs volunteers for the short event helping with the stations! space is becoming more defined in Mahnommen! Soon kids will be exploring a playground-bananza filled with logs, mudpies, rock stepping stones, and other nature-based fun!

Additionally, Crookston was recently crawling with environmentally-conscious High School students from the area! It was a celebration congratulating the achievements of the students involved in the River Watch Program and the insight gained from their data collection on the rivers!

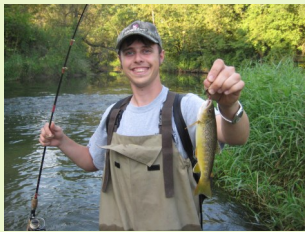
